

A VISIT WITH MARTY JONES

INTERVIEW & STORY BY GEORGE HUNT


Marty Jones of Music Man Photography grew up in Springfield, Missouri. Marty tells me he went to Parkview, Central, and Hillcrest. We both laughed. He would have graduated in 1987. He earned his GED in 2014. Marty said "I grew up country until 6th grade. I liked Hot Wheels; things that kids play with. Then my stepdad's son came to live with us. He brought the first Foreigner, the first Kansas, Frampton Comes Alive, and Kiss Dressed to Kill albums. Ever since that day it has been nothing but music in my life".

I asked Marty what he thought happened with this music? "It was definitely a change. I grew up with Conway Twitty, Loreta Lynn, Merle Haggard, and George Jones. On the LP 'KISS Dressed to Kill' there were two songs, Getaway and Rock Bottom. These songs changed my life forever. I thought 'Holy Cow', I need to do something with that". In 2011 Marty started to get into photography pretty heavy.

"I have always taken pictures at shows. I have every issue of Metal Edge and Hit Parade for the last 15 years. All are in mint condition; all are in sleeves. The posters are all intact. Before I started collecting those, I would buy them, and this is no exaggeration, from floor to

ceiling, I would cut around outlets etc. There was nothing but musicians covering my walls. There were no walls visible, only posters."

Marty got a Cannon T3I camera for \$300 and started taking pictures of bands. Getting on Facebook, Marty noticed that there would be an advertisement for a show, but then there would be no follow up by anyone. Pictures were Marty's passion. "I thought, as much of a music freak as I





am. I am going to go out and take pictures of bands and start posting them. I think it would help put butts in seats. People look at my pictures. People say, 'Well, that band must be good, there are people there'. People will go check them out. I make sure that there are always crowd pictures in everything I take. Even if there are ten people there, I will make it look good".



My wife, Renee', noticed at Erin Coburn's show how Marty moves through the crowd with professionalism and ease. Marty says a weird thing happened the last time Samantha Fish was here. "I headed up toward the front of the room, and it was like the red sea parted. I was like, WOW! Then, when I got to the front of the stage, people moved back and gave me the whole run of the stage". Marty recognizes that this it was "cool". Yes, everyone knows and respects Marty.

Marty said "I get to hang out with cool people and listen to cool music. That is all I am after. Everything else is just a bonus". I asked what his favorite rock bands are. "Ozzie and Black Sabbath are at the top of the list. I am an 80's





child. I'm big on the hair bands. I like the obscure bands. Jake E. Lee of Badlands is a favorite. He played with Ozzie, but his stuff is great. Richie Kotzen is another great, he has some blues influence in his playing. Dave Meniketti of the Y & T band has a blues album. Jon Lord of Deep Purple has a blues album also. Cindi Lauper's blues album will fool you. She does not sound like herself.


Five or six years ago a few musicians got together and bought me a new camera. This was the 'it' moment. When people give you money to buy a camera, you know that you have made an impact and you are doing the right thing, when people care about what you do".

"One of the first things I did was Bikes, Blues, and Hot Cars. Anthony Gomes was the headliner. This was the first time I was able to be on the stage. When Anthony got finished with a song, I said 'Hey man let me have that pick while it is smoking'. He handed me his pick, that is 'cool shit right there'. Anthony snickered like yes; it is still smoking". A moment with an artist is something you never forget.

Marty's favorite moments to catch are: when a guitar player bends a string up and touches another string, or a bass player might hit a string and catch a vibrating string. These happen rarely, but that is what he tries for, some just happen. Like a drummer who broke a stick with his hand in the air, and the broken half was in the picture. Yes, luck does happen in photography. You still must be there clicking away to capture the obscure shots.

Marty does not want to be the center of attention when he is on stage. He wants to take his pictures and get out. Marty always asks of course, about coming up on stage. Marty figures out what he wants to shoot before he even approaches the stage. "The first year I started, I ran myself in the ground. If there was a show at 5 o'clock. I would go there and stay until another show would start. I have been known to shoot the Chili Cookoff all day. I would go to 6 shows after that. But not anymore. Now an hour or two on Friday night and hour or so on Saturday night. Plus, the venues have changed over the last couple of years".

"I respect drummers. They must be in shape to play all night. I also have a thing for bad ass guitar players. Robin Trower is someone who I respect a lot. There is just something about him. He is



true to his style. Look how many bands have lasted for 30 years. They may not have the same members, but they are still popular. They stand the test of time. I would like to do more nature pictures".

Marty is always improving his technique. Marty has also done some podcasts. "I would like to be published in Metal Edge magazine or something like that". Marty has had several pictures printed in the newspaper. "That is a big




thrill. To be accepted. I want people to look at my work and say that is a bad ass picture. To be a music fan and to have this all going on. I am way cool with it". We are too Marty.

Marty's impact in the music community really extends beyond what he captures through his camera lense. Below are comments and testimonials from folks that reflect their thoughts and feelings about the man behind the camera.

To me, music is a necessity. It can change people's moods, make people happy. To be able to do that for people as a performer is an amazing feeling. Music has had such a big impact in my



life and it's so great seeing all the talent and happiness in this little community of Springfield.

Dean Daisy testimonial:

As my wife just said, "Marty has given us memories that will last a lifetime!" and I agree wholeheartedly with that comment. For me personally, "Marty has provided me so many memories that I can't count them. Awesome photos that capture moments on stage that might be forgotten otherwise. Marty works hard to capture those special moment in time."

For the music scene in general Marty loves what he does and it shows in his work ethic. He's a bit of a local "Beatle Bob" in that he's always out at a music

venue hearing a band and always armed with his camera capturing a local band and then taking the time to share those photos with the band and musicians. These photos are often posted on Facebook and shared among the local music scene which is awesome to get the word out about local bands to check out.

Marty's contributions really mean a lot to me and I'm sure others who get to enjoy seeing all his great photos. Marty's contributions to the local music scene shouldn't be understated. He's a great guy that puts in the effort with no expectation compensation but does it for his love of music and photography. I'm thankful he's willing to share his time and talents with the local music scene.

Paul Thomlinson testimonial:

I knew I was going to like Marty Jones the first time I heard his tagline for Music Man Photography:" Musicians will be shot on sight, all others will be framed." It was clever as hell and had just the right amount of dark humor, which is also a pretty good description of the man himselfif you add super talented, good hearted and incredibly generous to the list.

But another important thing I learned about Marty right away is that he is a music fan first and foremost, with a near encyclopedia knowledge of rock and blues, and a memorabilia collection to make us all green with envy. Put all that together and you begin to see why he means so much to the music community around here, and certainly gives of his time and talent simply because he loves music, and he loves to support musicians in what we do. He has consistently shown

up at gigs near and far, early, and late, indoors, and outdoors, and has donated untold thousands of dollars' worth of his work to the music community here. Why? For the same reason all my favorite artists do what they do...for the love of music. All of us owe Marty big time, and I hope he knows how grateful we are for him.

Alyssa Galvan has been chosen as the Blues Society of the Ozarks 2022 representative to

the International Blues Challenge Youth Showcase, which will be held in Memphis, Tennessee later this year. She was awarded \$500.00 via the Debbie Rule Youth Music Scholarship (D.R.Y.M.S) Program, which was set up in 2021 to help youth attend music workshops.

The Blues Society of the Ozarks co-hosted a fundraiser on 11/14/2021. along with Hold Fast Brewery, to help





Alyssa with expenses for her trip to the IBC and Youth Showcase. Justin Larkin. Mike Snow, Justin Coble and The Yetis (George Hunt and Ron Love) were guest artists. Fund raising activities included the BSO raffling a gift basket created by board member Renee' Hunt, as well as holding a 50/50 cash drawing. All together over \$1,500.00 was raised to help with expenses for Alyssa's trip. Al Rule and Renee' Hunt presented the symbolic "oversized" check to Alyssa at the end of the fundraiser.

Alyssa Galvan is a rising singer and songwriter from Southwest Missouri. Alyssa, who is now 16, always enjoyed listening to music and singing along with songs on the radio as a tyke. She first picked up a guitar and took lessons with Shane Smith, at Ernie Williamson's Music



in Joplin, MO at the age of 10. After about a year and a half of lessons, her instructor was confident that Alyssa knew the basics of guitar. That was when she began to learn more by immersing herself in music, going to her first open mic at the age of 12, and playing her first gig at the age of 13. Alyssa has now performed in four states and continues to perform at local breweries, restaurants, and large festivals in NW Arkansas.

When asked about her influences, she said she was really into Iggy Pop/
The Stooges, as well as Jack White. This opened her up to old blues, such as Blind Willie McTell, Bessy Smith, Rosetta Tharp, etc. Alyssa loves seventies punk music, and that is what really got her into wanting



to explore and consider music. Eventually through exploring music, she found a big love for Delta Blues.

Alyssa recently released a self-titled acoustic album, which can be found on all streaming platforms.

This show at The Riff was



keyboards, and vocals, and Dean Daisey on bass and vocals. This band has been a staple of Springfield music for quite a while. Papa Green Shoes has a good following, as was seen at this show. These guys are as tight as any professional band should be. They had the crowd dancing in their set. The band was flying from the first note!

Erin Coburn is a graduate of The Pinetop Perkins Workshops in Clarksdale, Mississippi. Young men and women who are interested in The Blues come there for training in their chosen



Erin's music cannot be put in a box. She is innovative and a band leader beyond her years. I am anxious to see what she does in the future. On this tour Brandon Pettiford played drums and Kainan Shank played bass. These fellows




were top notch and fun to watch. A friend who has known Erin since she was at Clarksdale, put me in touch with her. She was glad to have me play two songs with her. She told me the songs we would be doing and the keys that they would be played in. I showed up for a sound check. We played a short version of "I've Got A Problem With You", which we would play that night on the show. Erin mentioned that we would jam longer that evening. It is interesting when you meet and jam with someone for the first time. I could feel that I had surprised the band with my playing. Of course, this makes me happy!

As I said, the band was top notch, so playing with a band this good, raises your level also. That night at the show, the first song went great, with me doing a small lead. "The Sky Is Crying" was the second song I played on. Somewhere




in the middle of this song, Erin started throwing licks at me to return for a "Call and Response". Wow, a simple blues technique, that has been around a long time. This was magic, because the music meld happened with energy of acceptance and respect towards each other.












erupted, with the band all smiling. Erin and I bumped fists in the air, and exploded them. Wow what a "moment" for sure. The attention that I soon would have from my musical peers in the audience, told me that my feeling was right. This was one of my lifetime highlights of being on stage!

I believe that music can transcend and make people happy. This magic was in the room this night.

Erin and the band were very nice people. Erin's parents were also with her on this tour, working and overseeing everything. I told them that I would be smiling about this experience for a long time. Yes, today I am still smiling! A wide range of artists and genres have inspired Erin throughout her musical journey. Everyone from BB King, Stevie Ray Vaughan, and the Rolling Stones, to Alice In Chains, Arctic Monkeys, and Nothing But Thieves. You can hear these influences lightly woven throughout her repertoire of songs. While she brings the sounds of modern Rock front and center, Erin never forgets her heavily Blues and Classic Rock influenced past. Fans of Royal Blood, Black Keys, Gary Clark Jr, and White Stripes will thoroughly appreciate Erin's music.

BLUES HISTORY SPOTLIGHT

Beverly "Guitar" Watkins was born April 6, 1939 in Atlanta, Georgia, and raised in the country by her sharecropper grandparents (her mother died when she was three months old). Watkins was a "tomboy" who went fishing and rabbit hunting with her grandfather. She also listened to her aunts sing in churches, as well as the gospel and guitar stylings of Sister Rosetta Thorpe.

She was given a guitar when she was eight years old, which she took to barn dances, where her grandfather and his friends would set around a big fire playing banjos and drinking wine.






When she was 11 years old, she went to live with her aunt in Atlanta.

At 16 she met William Lee 'Piano Red' Perryman, a larger-than-life black albino singer/pianist, who asked her to play rhythm guitar in his group Piano Red & The Meter Tones. "He was like a father to us", she said. "He taught me stage presence".



A professional musician since the late 1950s, Beverly worked with the likes of Piano Red, BB King, Ray Charles, and James Brown, but never achieved breakthrough success for herself. After falling off the radar in the 80s, she bounced back in 1999 with a brilliant album, aptly titled 'Back In Business'.

Beverly's style was extraordinarily flashy, and one of her trademarks was






playing her guitar behind her head. She played songs that inspired the 60's wave of rock and roll.



When the great Taj Mahal heard Beverly, he fell in love with her playing and took her on a 42-city tour with him. He called her a "flat-out musician, who could duke it out on a stage with the best there is – man, woman, or child prodigy".

Watkins latter career was hindered by health issues including cancer, a heart attack, and a brain aneurysm, but she never stopped performing.

She was re-discovered by Music Maker Relief Foundation founder Tim Duffy, who started booking her in package shows, and in 1998, with Koko Taylor and Rory Block, was part of the all-star Women of the Blues "Hot Mamas" tour. Her 1999 CD debut, *Back in Business*, earned a W. C. Handy Award nomination in 2000.



She passed on following a heart attack on October 1, 2019, at the age of 80.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE BSO BOARD

RAY ROSS

Ray Ross and the Sometimes Righteous

That name was given to Ray by a fellow coworker who saw that he could be a bit preachy on certain subjects. But there is a great deal more to Ray Ross. Ray retired from a career at City Utilities of Springfield - Electrical Transmission and Distribution, as the Director for Pricing and Forecasting. Besides being a full-time musician, Ray has been the Treasurer for the Blues Society of the Ozarks and an active member on the Board for several years.



Ray and his family; wife Jamie, son Ray Henry, son John, daughter Emily, and stepson Colton, love living in the Ozarks. Ray was born in Brandon, Mississippi and is a graduate of Mississippi State University - as an Electrical Engineer. Ray said his first guitar was given to him when he was 8 or 9 years old, and he got serious about it when he started college. Ray said, "I got an electric



guitar to keep up with the rest of the people in the dorm rooms." His first real gig came after Ava Jane and her mom would listen to Ray and Gary Gibson - a musical partner and fellow employee. They would practice in a community club house. Ava Jane wanted Ray and Gary to play for her birthday party. Ray added, "From there I played open mic venues. We played at the Moon City Pub quite a bit."





Ray is attending Musicians Institute - College of Contemporary Music online. Ray said, "I'm making sound grades and learning a lot about music production and performance. The program is probably better for people in their 20's. I have craved the knowledge but did not have it. My online guitar instructor is Tom Kolb, and Mike Mennell for bass guitar. The beginning of an assignment is a train wreck. But by the end of the assignment, it sure makes more sense. The process of learning is a valuable lesson. The class is also moving into nylon string guitar."

Rodrigo y Gabriela is a Mexican acoustic guitar duo featuring Rodrigo Sanchez and Gabriela Quintero. These two, 'beat box' the guitar besides playing it. Ray, Jamie, and Colton saw this duo in concert in Kansas City. "They are amazing with an entertaining performance. Their musical



influences range from flamenco, jazz, rock; even Metallica." We started talking about the power of music and how it effects people. One of Ray's long-term friends Greg was soon to ask Teresa to marry him, and at their wedding Ray played this song by Drive-By Truckers, 'Everybody Needs Love'. When the chorus came around, everybody was singing along. "I'm not a rock star, but the magic of those people singing the chorus was magical." Ray continued, "It was a



special moment for us and anybody who was there. Your song selection can do it. A person is at a show and you play a song that is important to them or a pivotal point in their lives. You can make them think of something differently. These occurrences seem to provide a supernatural direction to them. The power of music, there is nothing like it. The opportunity for all who are there to experience this at the same time is incredible. I think when this happens, everybody's heart


rate is in sync. At least that is how it feels. 'Fisherman's Blues' a song by the Waterboys. This is a song that by the end you figure out this guy is in prison and dreaming of freedom through fishing. Very subtly, our moods are influenced by the music we make, and by other people also. Happiness, sadness, anger can all be felt in a few short words. You can take 20 or 30 words and couple that with music. Now you have a complete idea that can compel people to envision or apply this to their own life. Sometimes a 6-minute song can contain a novel worth of ideas." Ray added, "We have to believe in ourselves as musicians. I just want to play music for



the rest of my life. I think it is pretty cool that we are into something that will never wear out. We will never be out of learning, playing, or enjoying music. Hanging out in a music store can give you inspiration. A new set of strings, a different pick can make things sound different enough to get new inspiration."

As this brief interview concludes, it's clear that this musical journey continues for Ray Ross.

As Ray wraps up his tenure as BSO Treasurer in 2022, the Blues Society of the Ozarks expresses its' sincere thanks for his exceptional service, commitment, and dedication as a trusted Board officer, as a valuable member, and as great friend. Bravo!
