A VISIT WITH ART BENTLEY

Recently I had the amazing opportunity to sit down with Art Bentley and talk about his illustrious career in the music business. With his professional career spanning over 30 years and his fledgling years getting started, we had a lot to talk about, and I would like to share some of that with you all.



Art was born in Jonesboro, Arkansas and by school age had moved to West Plains, Missouri where he attended grades K-12. Being an only child, Art had plenty of time on his hands to put a guitar in them! His mother helped him buy his first guitar, and he used to hide it under his bed, take it out and spend hours messing around with it. Art is a self-taught guitar and harmonica player, and he plays everything by ear.



He has also dabbled in playing the keyboards and mandolin, and his grandpa Walter bought him his first harmonica in 1975. Art's grandpa also taught him how to play the banjo, so you could call him an "aspiring banjo player"! His grandpa used to take him to Bluegrass festivals and listen to grandpa play along. Art is grateful for these jams he attended with his grandpa. Bluegrass has many roots, and it is an opportunity he thoroughly enjoyed being a part of. He enjoyed being a part of the Bluegrass scene and all those involved in it. However. he didn't take to the banjo like he did with the guitar, and soon Art was learning songs by the Rolling Stones and Led Zeppelin. In these two very classic rock bands, Art was able to

hear the Blues music coming through loud and strong in their work. That got under his skin (or guitar strumming fingers) and he has always considered himself a Blues Artist. When asked if there were any other genres of music that interested him, he replied with "a little gospel". He is currently branching out into some Jazz, as a natural progression of the music world.

As our conversations continued, I was curious about Art's early years in his music. Did you have other bands before your career took off? He mentioned "The Trenchmen" a blues rock band he put together with a couple of high school buddies, that had strong Rolling Stones blues overtones. He played his first gig of all time with this band at Nathan P. Murphy's and was quite proud of that.

Asking Art about what actual musicians influenced his sound, he piped right up that Otis Rush was his biggest influence and actually got his 'Blues Bug' going! Then there was Elmore James and Marion Walter Jacobs, known as Little Walter, who





Art said, "everything he played was gold"! I did a little research on these 3 musicians and even listened to some of their songs. Otis Rush (1934-2018) was an American Blues guitarist and singer songwriter... just what Art grew up to be! His distinctive guitar style featured a slow-burning sound and long bent notes. (Wikipedia)

Elmore James (1918-1963) was also an American Blues guitarist, singer songwriter, and bandleader. James was known as the "King of the slide guitar" and noted for his loud amplification and stirring voice. For his contributions to the music world, Elmore James was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1992. (Wikipedia) I looked up James on YouTube and found that he was the original song writer of "The Sky is

Crying", a fabulous blues licks that SRV also paid tribute to.

Finally, there was Little Walter (1930-1968) an American Blues Musician whose revolutionary approach to the harmonica had a strong impact on succeeding generations, earning him comparisons to such seminal artists as Django Reinhardt, Charlie Parker, and Jimi Hendrix. (Wikipedia) Little Walter truly played a fine blues harmonica.

Getting back to how Art's solo career took off, he told me he used to play at the Outland open mic nights. From those performances his career just sorts of snowballed and grew into him making music for a living, very organic in its nature. He has played





nearly every venue in the Springfield and surrounding area during his time behind the mic.

What I find fascinating about Art Bentley is how he established an 8 to 10 year career (and still going strong) on the Lake Circuit in Missouri. From May to late October, you can almost always find Art at one of the clubs around Lake of the Ozarks, Table Rock Lake, and many of the lake towns in that area. Asked how he got started in that, he replied that the Barrett Brothers heard him play and invited him to play before their band at a club in Osage Beach called Dog Days. By word of mouth, he began to get more gigs around there and today most of his summers are spent in that area.

The BSO managed to snag
Art for our August 8, 2021 IBC
(International Blues Challenge) and
he was awarded first place for his
efforts. Asked if he was pleased, he
belted out, "Heck Yeah!" Art will be
representing the BSO in Memphis in
January 2022 at the IBC as a solo act.



He is anxious to wrap up his travels and shows and slow down a little to focus on his Memphis presentation.

I asked Art a series of questions that can best be relayed in this article as a Q&A type of interview. Let's get started...

DR: What was the name of the first song you wrote?

AB: I believe that would be called 'Sarah Jane' which is on one of my Nashville recorded albums.

DR: What is your favorite song you have written and performed? **AB**: 'Just Another Fool' that I wrote and recorded with my band Blue Contagion.

DR: How many instruments do you play?

AB: That would definitely be the guitar and harmonica, and as I mentioned earlier have played a few other instruments as needed to fill in on recordings of albums.

DR: Are there any instruments you

would still like to learn how to play? **AB:** I admire the cello and the fiddle, but don't want to spread myself too thin, so don't know if that will ever happen.

DR: Are there any bands or acts you have opened up for during your career?

AB: Yes, I have. Dierks Bentley and Eric Church

DR: Do you have a Bucket List you would like to pursue before you put your guitar and blues harp down? **AB:** I would love to go back to Memphis and record another album.



DR: Anyone you would like to sing or play with?

AB: I think Lucinda Williams would be fun to work with.

As our conversation began to wind down, I had just a couple more questions for Art and he had a thing or two to say to readers of this Bluesletter.


DR: Has there been a time during your music life that you have given guitar, harmonica, or any instrument lessons?

AB: Art replied, "I have given some guitar lessons at Springfield Music back in the day. I really enjoy teaching kids the basics of the guitar and get them started."

DR: Do you have any words of wisdom you can give to aspiring artists out there today? Art stroked his beard for a few seconds and said, "just hang in there, don't give up, and BE TRUE TO YOURSELF."

My last question to Art Bentley was this: What do you consider your greatest accomplishment of your career so far? Again, a pause and he said, "the privilege of still doing it!" In a one-word summation he said LONGEVITY.

I thanked Art for his time in gathering this information on his career. He wanted me to tell everyone he was happy to be considered for this Bluesletter interview. He enjoyed



performing at the IBC back in August at Galloway Station; the crowd, he said, was great and the icing on the cake was that he won!

BLUES HISTORY SPOTLIGHT

Esther Phillips was born Esther Mae Jones in Galveston, Texas on December 23, 1935, and began singing in church as a young child. When her parents divorced, she split the time between her father who lived in Houston and her mother who lived in the Watts area of Los Angeles, California. It was while she was living in Los Angeles that her sister entered her in a talent show




belonging to bluesman Johnny Otis. He




was so impressed with the 13-year-old that he brought her into the recording studio for a session with Modern Records, and added her to his live revue. Billed as Little Esther, she scored her first success when she teamed with the vocal quartet The Robins (who later

evolved into The Coasters) on the Savoy record label single "Double Crossin Blues". It was a massive hit, topping the R&B charts in the early 1950s and paving the way for a series of successful singles bearing Little Esther's name: "Mistrustin' Blues", "Misery", "Cupid Boogie", and "Deceivin Blues". In 1951, Little Esther moved from Savoy to Federal after a dispute over royalties, but despite being the brightest female star in Otis' review, she was unable to duplicate her impressive string of hits. Furthermore, she and Otis had a falling out, reportedly over money, which led to her departure from his show. She remained with Federal for a few years, then moved to Decca in 1953, again with little success.

In 1954 she returned to Houston to live with her father. By the late 50's she had experimented with hard drugs





and developed an addiction to heroin. Reportedly, Esther had a drug addiction since her teenage years, having a lasting impact on her health, and eventually it claimed her life by the age of 50.

She re-signed on with Savoy in 1956, to little avail. Short on money, Little Esther worked in small nightclubs around the south, punctuated by periodic hospital stays stemming from her addiction. In 1962 she was rediscovered, while singing in a Houston night club, by future country star Kenny Rogers, who got her signed on to his brother's Lenox label. Too old to be called Little Esther, she re-christened herself as Esther Phillips, choosing her

last name from a nearby 'Phillips' gas station. Phillips recorded a countrysoul reading of the soon to be released "Release Me", which was released as a single later in the year. In the wake of Ray Charles groundbreaking countrysoul hit "I Can't Stop Loving You", "Release Me" was a smash. "Release Me" topped the charts and hit the Top Ten on both pop and country charts. Back in the public eye, Phillips recorded a country-soul album of the same name, but Lenox went bankrupt in 1963.

Thanks to her recent success. Phillips was a catch for R&B giant Atlantic, which recorded her in a variety of settings to see what niche she might fill best. One might say that she was too versatile for her own good.

Phillips cut a blues-tinged album of standards. Her string-laden remake of the Beatles song "And I Love Him" (naturally, with the gender changed) nearly made the R&B Top Ten in 1965, and the Beatles flew her to the U.K. for her first overseas performances. Encouraged Atlantic pushed her into an even jazzier territory for her next album. However, it did not generate much response. Eventually Atlantic

dropped her in late 1967. Ultimately Phillips would sign on with Atlantic one more time after a rehab stint, only to be dropped again by Atlantic. In 1975 Philips scored her biggest hit since "Release Me" with a disco-fied update of Dinah Washington's "What a Diff'rence a Day Makes" and the accompanying album of the same name.

In 1977, Phillips changed record companies several more times, to eventually gain creative control of her career with Mercury, but none matched the commercial success she desired. Her last R&B chart single was 1983's "Turn Me Out", a one off for the small Winning record label. Unfortunately, her health started to deteriorate from the culmination of her previous years of addiction, combined with hard drinking. Phillips died in Los Angeles on August 7th, 1984 of liver and kidney failure.



The programs attended by the recipients generally take place in the summer at the recipient's choice of location. However, if lessons are the choice of the participant, it can be any time of the year. Concerning applications; a letter of recommendation must accompany the application for the D.R.Y.M.S. scholarship. The deadline for the summer scholarship is Tuesday, May 31, 2022. In addition to receiving a free Blues Society of the Ozarks membership, the youth is requested to write an article for the BSO Blues letter about their experience with the workshop or lesson session.

The D.R.Y.M.S. will award up to \$500.00 per year to applicants preferably from the Ozarks area or Springfield, MO. A fundraiser will be held each year around October 24th, Debbie Rule's Birthday, for D.R.Y.M.S. to continue to help keep the blues alive through the youth.
