# JOEL CHAMBERLAIN

#### INTERVIEW & STORY BY NEIL BAKER

The word gentleman is a common title given to many men in our daily interactions and conversations. It is often bandied about, without much thought to the meaning behind the word. Then there are men, who carry themselves with a dignity and class that the term "gentleman" isn't just a salutation. They are the living embodiment of the word. Joel Chamberlain is one of those people. This is the story of Joel - BSO Past President, Board Member, and Musician.

Joel Chamberlain was born in 1953 in the tiny town of Platte, in eastern South Dakota. His family moved to the Black Hills of South Dakota when Joel was 5 years old.



Joel's older brother Lynn was a 50's car guy. Joel and his brother Lee got to watch a 1930 Model "A" Ford get turned into a real hot rod, right in front of their little eyes. So, the old car bug was already in Joel's blood when his family moved to Sturgis, South Dakota, when Joel was in the 4th grade.

"Sturgis was just a little cattle town of 6,000 souls on the northern edge of the Black Hills", recalled Joel, when they first moved there.



Joel witnessed the town grow when he was in high school, as the famous Sturgis Motorcycle Rally began attracting riders and tourists from all around the world.

#### Joel gets the music bug...

Even before Joel bought his first old car – a 1947 Chevy, he and his pals were plotting to learn how to play guitars so they could start a band. The music seed was planted and beginning to grow. The Beatles appeared on the Ed Sullivan show, then the Rolling Stones, the Animals, and others soon



followed. Joel and his pals were right in front of the TV set checking out the moves and these new sounds. They worked summer jobs and after school, to earn cash for that first electric guitar. By the end of the 6th grade, they had amps, guitars, and drums. Practicing their music night and day was what they lived for. Some actual skills eventually followed and their band, "Grapes of Wrath" was challenged to a battle of the bands, as their first public gig at a Sturgis Jr. High School dance. They smoked the older high school guy's band and Joel's music career was on its way.

From the ages of 14 to 18, Joel kept the rock and roll band going in high school. They played at most of the school dances and in a bar three nights a week. "Those were amazing times. We had a tight band playing all the latest tunes, doing a lot of gigs around the Black Hills and even had a faux psychedelic light show." During this time, Joel started experimenting with other instruments and took turns playing the Bass guitar.

#### College days and fast nights...

Joel left Sturgis and the band behind to attend architecture school in 1971 at Kansas State University, where he eventually got a Bachelor of Architecture degree.

The music bug was never out of him however and he jammed with others all through college.

While studying at K-State, Joel discovered bluegrass music which was prolific in the area and took up

playing the fiddle. Violin lessons through the University helped get this skill set started.

After graduation, Joel went back to the Black Hills to begin his career as an architect. His old high school pals were now playing country-rock and were anxious to have a fiddle player – even a novice. So, Joel got trial by fire playing every weekend from 9 pm to 1am with the Aspen Grove Band, that later morphed into The Fabulous Hat Band. The Fabulous Hat Band played the Ox Yoke Ranch Festival at Nemo for three consecutive years and was on the bill with The Red Willow band and Poco for one of their Black Hills engagements. This phase of Joel's life ended when he moved to Alaska to practice architecture.

#### Fast forward to the BSO...

After moving to Missouri after 12 years in Alaska, raising a family and starting an architecture firm, what was next for Mr. Joel Chamberlain? Well, how about becoming the President of the Springfield Chapter of The American Institute of Architects, followed by being president of the Blues Society of the Ozarks for two years. This took place over time.



Mary Certain, who moved to Springfield, became a Blues Society member, and until recently our chapter President was the gateway for Joel to enter the world of the BSO. Mary was an active member in Wichita Blues for 40 years and when she moved to Springfield 6 years ago, she wanted to get involved with the Blues Society here in Springfield.

After attending a few chapter meetings, she began to bring Joel along. As stated above, Joel had

previous organizational and board member experience and felt he could bring something to the Blues Society of the Ozarks to help build up the chapter.

Joel followed the path from being a board member to the BSO President, for the 2016-2018 two-year term. Some of the accomplishments he is proud of during his term as president include:

- · A professional structure to the BSO.
- · Developed the monthly socials
- $\cdot$  Encouraged the BSO to start monthly jam sessions
- · Puts on the Chamberjam Summer Membership Picnic at his and wife Mary Certain's home out near Fair Grove



The next chapter...

Today Joel is still active on the board as our Sergeant at Arms, writes newsletter articles, and provides continuity to the board.

He's still actively working as an architect and his skills and professionalism are in constant demand. On the music front, Joel has re-activated himself with playing the fiddle and bass guitar, plays in a band





and at the BSO jams, and is always looking for more musicians to play with.

If you have a minute, swing by the Chamberlain house near Fair Grove sometime. They always welcome visitors. Chances are you'll find Joel hanging out in the incredible gazebo he built on his house this year, or out fussing with a classic car he is working on out back or playing music with his daughters Dana and Aurora when they're visiting, and overseeing Mary nurturing her peppers out back on their property... Surrounded by nature and listening to the Blues.

## **BLUES HISTORY SPOTLIGHT**

One of my favorite blues festivals to attend is the King Biscuit Blues Festival in Helena Arkansas. I especially like to go to the Call and Response symposium that is hosted by Roger Stolle and Don Wilcock, in the Malco Theater. It is a wonderful way to get to know blues artists' backgrounds and inspirations.

This year, among the first group, was **Miss Australia "Honeybee" Jones-Neal.** Born in Flora

MS., she is now 78 years young. She spent much
of her life in Indianapolis, Indiana, but moved to
Indianola, Mississippi, when she retired in 2003 from
being an overhead crane operator in a steel mill.
It is quite the inspiration that she has come out of
retirement and is now the new voice of blues in the
Delta.

Mississippi Delta Blues comes to mind when one hears her play. She reportedly looks up to the greats like Jr. Wells, Muddy Waters, Little Milton, and of course her brother Paul "Wine" Jones.

"Honeybee" as she likes to be called, started picking guitar at the age of 5. She is self-taught and got her inspiration from her daddy, a sharecropper musician who played at juke joints and churches in and around Flora. She is the sister of bluesman Paul "Wine" Jones, who recorded on the Fat Possum record label. Paul was her younger brother and she taught him to play the guitar at an early age.

In 2005 she promised her brother, while he was on his death bed, that she would keep playing the guitar and keep the blues alive.

She has performed at Buddy Guy's Club, The House of Blues, King Biscuit Festival, the Juke Joint Festival in Clarksdale, Mississippi, various clubs and more, now that the pandemic status has started to release blues players back into venues and festivals. I am looking forward to catching her again.

Honeybee is a prime example of how one can influence budding musicians to follow their dreams, and yet prove it is never too late in life to pursue keeping the blues alive.

The BITS program continues to educate people of all ages about the blues as a historic music form and how a simple harmonica can become an expressive instrument.



I'm Grayson Ackerkand and I'm 17 years old. My journey in music started 13 years ago when my grandpa bought me my first guitar for Christmas, and I would run around calling myself Rockin' Rooster.

I've always had a love for music, but everything changed when I joined band in elementary school, playing trombone. As I learned to read music, my rhythm developed, and it paved the way to learning music on a deeper level. I would play a few concerts a year for my school, eventually joining jazz band and learning some music theory, which has been one of the best choices I ever made.

At the time, I was living in my hometown of Boise, Idaho and my grandparents had moved back to Mississippi. So, my brother and I would stay with them in the summer, and that's when I started playing the blues for real. I was about 10 when I started playing in Clarksdale, with my grandpa occasionally joining in for a song or two.






Throughout the years in band, and going back to Mississippi, I would play in the Boise Blues Foundation jam nights, and went on to win their youth scholarship. I really thrived in jazz band and learned so much of what I use today.



I continued through school, going to Mississippi every summer and playing in the Delta. One day, my grandpa approached me and asked if I would play bass in a concert called The Alive After Five, because his usual player couldn't make it. Of course, I said yes. We practiced and practiced the set list until we had it perfect. After that show I knew I had to play the blues. I have now been living in the Delta for about a year, playing music with my grandpa and others, learning as many things as I can along the way. This year I was fortunate enough to be accepted into the Pinetop Perkins Masterclass on the drums, and I'm so excited to see where my journey can lead to next.

## MEMPHIS REVISITED BY LIZ LOTTMANN

There is a saying, "Never meet your idols - you may learn the truth." I can honestly say this is not always true. I got to know this musical diva, recently. My husband, George Hunt, Liz Lottman and her husband, Juergen Lottman, were asked to perform at a concert in Montrichard, France. We shared a villa and really got to know Liz as a person and her passion for music.



A native of Jonesboro, Arkansas, Ms.

Lottman was signed by Sam Phillips of Sun Studios as a songwriter and recording artist. She was inducted into the Arkansas Blues Hall of Fame and appointed Blues Ambassador for the Arkansas Blues Hall of Fame. She has served on the board of the Ozarks Blues Society of Northwest Arkansas and is currently the President of the Ozarks Blues Society. She continues of perform with her band Divas on Fire. Liz has long history in the music business... we will save the details for the book.

I couldn't pick just one favorite track from the CD. Below are a few of my favorites:

Why Do You Treat Me Like You Do, is the first track on the CD. The song was written by A. Disjlenkovich and L. Lottman. My best description of this track is it, "hits you in the face". Liz has a sultry voice and you feel her emotion with every word. The horns really bring the song home. Every track really packs a punch.




Why Can't I Be Satisfied, is the third track, written by H.R. Smith. This cut is heart breaking and really shows Liz's range. It is like she is having a conversation in your presence. Again, the musicians on this track are incredible. The horn sounds are so smooth, "like cutting through soft butter."

**Shake**, is the 11th track, written by Sam Cooke. This song was made famous by Otis Redding at The Monterey Pop Festival. This is a fun, light song. I dare you to sit still while listening. You have to get up and dance. Did I mention the horns on the CD are AMAZING?!

Below is a review I read about the CD: "True "Memphis Sound" featuring the right-on vocals of Liz Lottmann, backed by members of the Amazing Rhythm Aces, with special guest Ben Cauley of the legendary Bar-Kays. These seasoned Memphis players really deliver the package -- that indefinable





R&B/soul/country/blues/rock mélange of music that comes only from Memphis."

Liz is what a true blues singer is: Emotional, Soulful, Gritty, Sorrowful, Gutsy, etc. She really feels her songs and so will the audience. One minute her dancing and celebrating, the next moment her tearful and reflective. Don't just take my word for it. Get your own CD, you will be glad you did.



Debbie Rule Youth Music Scholarship (D.R.Y.M.S.) Application and Agreement

The Debbie Rule Youth Music Scholarship (D.R.Y.M.S.) was established in 2021, to honor Debbie's love for blues and unwavering support for keeping the blues alive. This scholarship was created to provide financial assistance to aspiring young blues musicians, whose limited financial resources might prohibit them from attending a blues music learning opportunity. D.R.Y.M.S. will award up to \$500.00 per year to selected applicants, preferably will be from Springfield, Missouri, or the Ozarks area.

This scholarship is available to those under the age of 21, to study on their instrument of choice through lessons at reputable camp seminars, or workshop programs in the United States. The programs attended by scholarship recipients generally take place in the summer at the recipient's choice of location. The scholarship may also be used to fund individual blues music lessons. D.R.Y.M.S. is a one year scholarship, but recipients may apply for the scholarship again in any subsequent year up to the age of

A letter of recommendation must accompany the application. The submission deadline for the scholarship is May 31st of each year. Recipients receive a free Blues Society of the Ozarks membership, in exchange for which recipients are requested to write an article for the BSO Bluesletter about their experience with the workshop or lessons, once completed. All decisions regarding the awarding of scholarships are at the sole discretion of the Blues Society of the Ozarks. Payment of scholardship awards are made by the Blues Society of the Ozarks directly to the person or organization providing the blues learning experience.


